Natural Disaster, Internal Displaced People and Media Coverage in Nepal

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Nepal, geographically located at Himalayan mountain regions and within territory of Monsoon climate, which caused high prone natural disasters regularly. Nepal ranks as the 10th most affected country in the world according to the Climate Risk Index. Approximately 80 percent of Nepal's population is at risk from natural and climate-induced hazards. Similarly, Nepal ranks 4th on climate change induced disaster, 11th ranks on earth quack disaster and 30th rank on flood and land slide disaster in the world. Landslide, Floods, Gacial Lake Outburst Floods (GLOFs), and Earthquake, Forest Fire, Drought and Avalanche are the most repeated disasters in Nepal.

Every year, a large number of people in Tarai (low land of Southern part of Nepal) become victims from floods during Monsoon seasons. In hill and mountain regions, people are affected every year by landslides and floods. Recently, Nepal has faced an earth quack disaster in western hill on 3 November 2023. Though, Government of Nepal has set immediate response plan under the ministry of Home Affiar, resettlement and reintegration plan for affected displaced people still in confusions from government side. People still in temporary location waiting for permanent solution of resettlement. Most of the organizations and civil societies concentrate on the immediate response of life saving during disaster time rather than their resettlement after disaster. Media can create a public pressure and make a public opinion regarding the resettlement of displaced person.

National broadsheet newspapers including government and private media houses will be reviewed for media coverage stories and news. One year cycle will be assessed to explore the situation. It will assess the status of Media Coverage of Natural Disaster, Internal Displaced People in Nepal during last one year (1 January -31 December of 2023). It will provide a glimpse of response towards the IDPs from government and non- government agencies.
