Main Events and Activities done in 2024 :

In 2024, *CRG* with the support from *The Fund for Global Human Rights* organised several events on the theme of "Justice, Security and Vulnerable Populations of South Asia". For the overall concept note please <u>click here</u>.

CRG while hosting the South Asian Segment of the programme has engaged with project related activities such as research, workshops, webinars, public lectures, conferences, publications and reports. Events and activities such as research, work of translation, workshops having practitioners from legal expertise to media, ground level dialogues, webinars and network building have been some of the approaches adopted while working on this research programme around intersectionality of issues such as, security at crossroads of food, water, gender, land, various facets of human security, climate security, digital security, public health, biosecurity, borders and marginalities, so on and so forth. We have engaged with learning about first hand local/ regional experiences of issues of social security, social protection, refugee and migrant protection, significance of conventions like the global compacts and renewed understandings of justice, care, vulnerabilities, and security. All these issues came to the forefront through discussions and research that scholars have worked on. In understanding the significance of justice for vulnerable population groups, including the displaced, and the duty to protect people as the fundamental responsibility of the state and society in a democratic set-up-with these objectives in mind, event discussions took place throughout 2024, alluding to the central theme of decolonising security studies in South Asia.

Brief Descriptions of select points as mentioned above:

A3. Workshops and Conferences

i)The First Consultative Meeting on the theme of "Security, Justice and Vulnerable Populations of South Asia" as mentioned above was held on 6 April 2024 in Kolkata. It saw a gathering of eminent jurists, legal practitioners, activists, policy analysts, teachers in security and peace studies, economists, and other social activists like media activists working on issues of non-traditional security, digital democracy, and histories of peace accords and dialogues. The Meeting was thematically divided into six sections - 1)Macro Security and Micro Insecurities 2)Law & Security- Juridical Issues to Security of Life 3)Issues of Gender Security 4)Issues of Human Security 5)Issues of Geopolitics, Marginal Areas, and the Issue of Security and 6)Dialogues and Network: Security,

Peace & Justice. This meeting highlighted the need for organising more discussions surrounding the global compacts on safe and secure migration, to produce policy briefs, organise fruitful discussions on food security, climate security, and most importantly land security. What does security of land mean to farmers? And to hold a public lecture either in Kolkata or preferably outside West Bengal, in one of the southern states of India.

ii)The Second event of the Research Programme, also mentioned above, was a follow up Workshop of the first Consultative Meeting. The workshop was held on 27-28 July 2024 in Kolkata. The specific purpose of the second workshop was to relocate the security question in the context of the post-colonial societies of South Asia, their problems of underdevelopment, issues of basic rights such as of food, shelter, education, work, health, the adverse impact of internal conflicts and conflicts with neighbours on these societies, and their struggles for justice – all of which redefine the problematic of security, compelling us to work for food security, social security, security from ecological and climate disasters, etc. Thus, the security question in the South is entangled with issues of life – life of the nation, people, and in particular lives of the vulnerable population groups in society. This workshop was divided into eight sessions including the inaugural and concluding sessions.

The main panels were - 1) A Conversation between Meenakshi Gopinath (Director, Women in Security, Conflict Management and Peace- WISCOMP) and Paula Banerjee (CRG and Asian Institute of Technology) on the work and activism of WISCOMP's early years, 2) Constitution & Security of Vulnerable Population Groups 3) Research in Progress- where all researchers as part of the research programme, presented their writing research papers and policy briefs, presented their works in progress 4) Security of Migrants, Refugees & Borderland People 5) Media, Communication & Perceptions of Security- where eminent media activists and scholars talked about the theme including the need to build a network of relevant stakeholders working on the theme and finally 7) The South Asian Perspective where renowned scholars talked about the subcontinent with focus on India, Bangladesh and Nepal. The Workshop also threw light on the need for a renewed understanding of notions such as security and justice particularly after the Pandemic. The workshop concluded with Ranabir Samaddar retaliating to the need to have one more workshop to see where the problematic has been adequately comprehended. He also spoke of future events like holding public lectures and

dialogues on the thematic not only in West Bengal but in other parts of India. He also spoke of organising three webinars by the end of 2024 and to do one or two translations of existing works on the theme.

iii)The Third Workshop of the Programme as suggested above was organised in Chennai, Tamil Nadu, in collaboration with the Directorate of Tribal Welfare, Government of Tamil Nadu and Centre for Justice and Equity, Madras School of Social Work. This workshop in form of a policy dialogue, through its three main themes - a) Law, Vulnerability, and Justice in South Asia b) Human and other forms of Protection and c) Tribal Migration & Food Insecurity in Tamil Nadu discussed advocacy of food security of tribal people by organising a public lecture on 20 September 2024mentioned above, critically reflected upon the factors of food and nutrition insecurities among tribal population in the backdrop of increased volume of tribal displacement and migration and Bring policy-makers, academics, legal experts and members of other civil society organisations across a table and initiate a policy debate on tribal food and nutrition insecurities. Environmental, Human, and other Forms of Protection was also discussed as part of one of the panel discussions, as well as Policies and Frameworks for Food and Livelihood Security.
